2 friendly **BEARS** in their **DEN** snacking on some sweet honey!


Knock and unlock the RED door! Count the bears behind the door. Walk around like a bear!

3 **SQUIRRELS** in their **NEST** eating acorns, as happy as can be!






Who's behind the **PURPLE** door? Let's *knock*, *knock*, and see!

FREE PLAY

Allow little ones to explore and play with the toy as they please! Opening and closing the locks and latches will improve their fine and gross motor skills. Plus, the animal illustrations can spark their creativity and inspire imaginative pretend play and storytelling!

SHARED READING

Read the included story with your child and encourage them to play an active role! This interactive activity can help develop their speech and language, communication, memory, number recognition, and critical thinking skills.



PLAY GUIDS SHARED READING ACTIVITIES

There are several ways to go about shared reading! Follow the activity prompts inside the story, then try out these activities:

Use the story to teach your child about different animals' diets, habitats, sounds, and movements. As you read, ask your child questions and encourage them to ask questions too!

Get your child's creative gears turning by asking them to add on to the story or create a whole new based on the illustrations.

When you come across numbers as you read, ask your child to repeat after you and point to the number on the board.

Ask your child questions that will exercise their critical thinking skills. For example, once they've learned that bees make honey, ask them where the bears got their honey from later on in the story.
